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Concerning the Dormition of the Theotokos, this is what the Church has received from ancient times from the tradition of the Fathers. When the time drew nigh that our Savior was well-pleased to take His Mother to Himself, He declared unto her through an Angel that three days hence, He would translate her from this temporal life to eternity and bliss. On hearing this, she went up with haste to the Mount of Olives, where she prayed continuously. Giving thanks to God, she returned to her house and prepared whatever was necessary for her burial. While these things were taking place, clouds caught up the Apostles from the ends of the earth, where each one happened to be preaching, and brought them at once to the house of the Mother of God, who informed them of the cause of their sudden gathering. As a mother, she consoled them in their affliction as was meet, and then raised her hands to Heaven and prayed for the peace of the world. She blessed the Apostles, and, reclining upon her bed with seemliness, gave up her all-holy spirit into the hands of her Son and God.

 With reverence and many lights, and chanting burial hymns, the Apostles took up that God-receiving body and brought it to the sepulcher, while the Angels from Heaven chanted with them, and sent forth her who is higher than the Cherubim. But one Jew, moved by malice, audaciously stretched forth his hand upon the bed and immediately received from divine judgment the wages of his audacity. Those daring hands were severed by an invisible blow. But when he repented and asked forgiveness, his hands were restored. When they had reached the place called Gethsemane, they buried there with honor the all-immaculate body of the Theotokos, which was the source of Life. But on the third day after the burial, when they were eating together, and raised up the artos (bread) in Jesus' Name, as was their custom, the Theotokos appeared in the air, saying "Rejoice" to them. From this they learned concerning the bodily translation of the Theotokos into the Heavens. These things has the Church received from the traditions of the Fathers, who have composed many hymns out of reverence, to the glory of the Mother of our God.

Words that Can Lead to Inner Peace by—St. Basil the Great

St. Basil like the other Fathers of the Church teaches that inner peace and sanctification come from spiritual exercise. For St. Basil spiritual exercise is synonymous with strengthening the heart. It is certain that if one could but practice by God's grace what he teaches, he would be certain to know inner peace and sanctification. Read what St. Basil says!

"Preparing the heart means unlearning evil prejudices. It is dusting off the tablet before writing on it. Now solitude is most useful for this purpose. It quiets our passions and makes room for holiness to cut them out of our heart...so then, set aside a place for yourself, separate from contact with other people so that your spiritual exercises won't be interrupted.

"Pure devoted exercises nourish the soul with godly thoughts. What can be better than imitating angel choruses on earth or beginning the day with prayer and honoring our Maker with songs and hymns or as the day brightens, praying throughout our duties and seasoning our works with hymns as with salt? Soothing hymns compose the mind, bringing it into a calm, cheerful state,

"So then, as I have said, quiet is the first step in our sanctification.

"It (i.e. quiet/inner peace) is the tongue that has been purified of the world's gossip.

"It is the eyes that are unexcited by beautiful color or lovely shape.

"It is the ear that doesn't relax the tone or mind by worldly songs, nor talk flippantly and joke about people.

"In this way, the mind is saved from external sensations. It falls back on itself and not on worldly senses. As a result, the mind rises up to contemplate God."

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STRENGTHENING MARRIAGE...*

Marriage today is in need of strengthening. Some say that it is in need of life support. The reason! The rate of divorces in America and Europe for the past several years has exceeded the rate of marriage. Statistics bear this out. Over five out of every ten marriages conducted the past year will end up in divorce. And the number of couples who choose to remain in marriage but who are unfaithful is frightening. Over 60% of all married men, and 40% of married women, have had or are having an affair.

The statistics are frightening.

Marriage as a divinely established institution that requires commitment, love, permanency and fidelity is suffering.

The “weakening” of marriage is affecting not only those “outside” of the Church. But it is also affecting those inside the Church. Sadly, many couples whom all of us know are suffering, separating, or have recently separated.

What can be done to strengthen marriage?

There is no easy answer. But the following 8 suggestions are basic, practical and elementary to strong marriages.

(1. Never enter a marriage with the thought that if things don't work out you can get a divorce.

Marriage according to the Bible is of God. It was established by God. It is intended to be permanent. In the Marriage Ceremony of the Orthodox Church it is prayerfully said, “Therefore a man shall leave his father and mother and cleave to his wife, and the two shall become one. And whosoever God has joined together, let no man put asunder...” The ring, which is a never ending line (circle) and is blessed by the priest during the Marriage ceremony, symbolizes this permanency.

(2. Love one another. Marriage is a Sacrament of Love. In the Epistle lesson that is read in the Sacrament of Marriage, Paul exhorts husbands as follows. “Let each one of you love your wife as himself...” (Ephesians 5:33). What this simply means is that husbands and wives must love one another as they want to be loved. Show love. Express it every day. Say “I love you” repeatedly. And do not say or do anything to the other that you would not want said or done to you.

(3. Share. In the Sacrament, a cup of wine is given to the couple to drink. It is called a cup of sharing. It is a reminder to couples that married life necessitates a common sharing of joys, sorrows, victories and defeats. The more couples share with one another, the happier they will be. Sharing also necessitates continual compromising on “unimportant” issues. I have never known a marriage to survive where the husband or wife always thought they were right.

(4. Cultivate humility. Paul in his beautiful encomium on love in I Cor. 13 says, “Love does not insist on its own way.” Be humble. Learn to apologize and to place the other person first. And perform acts of kindness. They pay dividends. A writer recently pointed out that an exhaustive study of police records shows that no wife ever shot her husband for doing the dishes, but instead have rewarded him in special ways.

(5. Communicate with one another without rancor, anger, hatred and unkind expletives. Good marriages are based upon mutual respect. Unkind and disparaging comments and choice four-letter words are not easily forgotten. In fact, they can and usually do permanently scar.

(6. Keep God at the center of your life. Come to church with one another. Sit with one another in church. Pray with one another. If you succeed in keeping God at the center of your life,

your marriage will not only be “successful” , but it will also be happy. As the Bible says, “If God be for us, who can be against us.”

(7. Persevere. Studies have indicated that the best marriages for most people was the one that they were in, and that it could have been saved had they worked harder at it. Good marriages are not built in a day, or a year or even 5 years. Rather good marriages come about through years of sharing and struggling to work things out.

(8. And finally. Heed the following admonitions. Do not lie to one another. Do not cheat on one another. . “Do not deprive one another except with consent for a time...” (I Cor. 7:5). Do not be envious of one another. Instead, love one another as Christ loved us: i.e. with a spirit of disinterested benevolence, loving the spouse for who he or she is rather than for what you want them to be.

I conclude by asking, “Is marriage as a Sacrament and institution today on a rocky road?” Indeed it is. I don’t need statistics to convince me of this. My own experiences in counseling, and my own knowledge of many wonderful loved ones and parishioners who have divorced have me convicted. The “situation,” to be sure is sad and discouraging. But not without hope!

As a Christian, who lives by faith in God, I believe that Marriage as a “state” from God can be restored to its rightful place. It can be restored, first and foremost, by the grace of God. And secondarily, but very importantly, it can be restored and strengthened by those who are planning to marry or who are presently married.

The strengthening of marriage rests in a couple’s love for one another and will.

Couples that love one another and will to do what is above recommended are those who will know the strengthening, permanency and joy of marriage as God intended them to be known.

This is the message of this article.

It is to this message that couples must respond.

PRESENTATION AND TALK ON RECENT TRIP TO CONSTANTINOPLE & HOLY LANDS

Father Paul from May 31-June 13 of this year led a group of 25 individuals on a spiritual pilgrimage to Constantinople and the Holy Lands. Sites such as Agia Sofia, the Patriarchate of Constantinople, the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem, and St. Katherine Monastery in Egypt were visited. Eighteen of the 25 "pilgrims" were from our parish. By special request, a 45 minute "reflection" and power point presentation on this trip will be given by Father Paul on Wednesday evening, August 10, 7:00 p.m. in the Fr. Emanuel Vasilakis Community Center. He will be assisted by Najwa Bateh and Jackie Eastman. All are invited.

Prior to the presentation, the Paraclesis Service will be held in the Cathedral at 5:30, followed by a Lenten supper at 6:30. The Lenten supper will be prepared and offered by Deno and Niickey Jovaras. We thank them in advance for their efforts.

FUNDS FOR CONSTRUCTION OF PAVILION APPROVED

At a special Parish Assembly Meeting held on June 26th, funds up to \$160,000.00 for the construction of a picnic pavilion at Camp Vakakes were approved. The pavilion will include toilet facilities, a room for a kitchen, and sitting for up to 200 people. The pavilion will do much to enhance the value of our property and increase its usage by our Parish.

Construction, which will take 6-8 weeks to complete, will commence in the fall. It will be overseen by the Parish Council and Jimmy Dikis, chairperson of the building committee. How to fund the building of the pavilion is presently being studied, discussed and decided upon by the Parish Council's Capital Improvements Campaign Committee.

More information will be forthcoming.

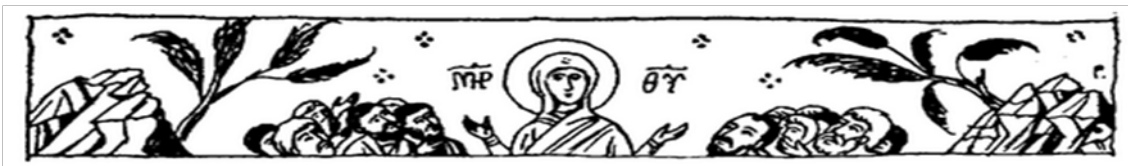

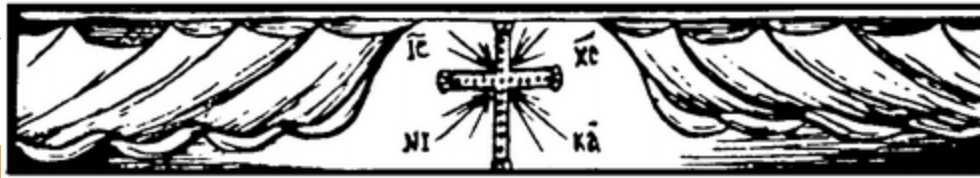

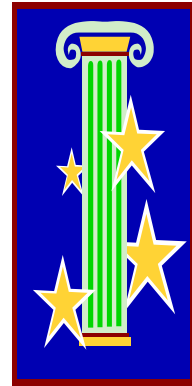
